THE FEDERAL MILITARY GOVERNMENT hereby decrees as follows :—

1. In section 3 of the Customs Tariff (Consolidation) Decree 1973 :—
(a) in subsection (1) thereof the figure (1) shall be deleted ; and
(b) subsections (2) and (3) shall be deleted.
2. This Decree may be cited as the Customs Tariff (Consolidation) (Amendment) Decree 1974 and shall come into force on 1st April 1974.
